The Sorrowful Mysteries

Agony in the Garden (anticipating an overwhelmingly difficult and painful task)

- 1. He comes with His closest friends, and leaves then behind
- 2. He is alone with the Father, and He is hit by fear
- 3. Tonight is the night it begins, and He thinks how horrible it will be.
- 4. What if He fails? What if he is too weak?
- 5. Can't there be another way? Please? Anything?
- 6. His friends are asleep. He is so very alone.
- 7. He thinks of the love he has for the Father.
- 8. He thinks of the love he has for his people.
- 9. He will do it. His will is like steel.
- 10. They have arrived. It is time.

Crowning with thorns (enduring the ridicule of most precious truths)

- 1. Jesus never sought an earthly crown or earthly power.
- 2. The Kingdom of God was His most cherished and important message.
- 3. The Soldiers mock what is closest to His heart.
- 4. They distort His message to torture Him.
- 5. What if someone sees this, and it makes it harder to believe the Good News later?
- 6. The thorns hurt so much, so very much.
- 7. The One most worthy of being the True King is treated as a clown.
- 8. With great love, Jesus sees how their mockery shows their dead souls.
- 9. They cannot know the sublime power of touching the truly sacred
- 10. Jesus pities them and asks the Father to forgive them.

Scourging at the pillar (enduring malice and suffering helplessly)

- 1. They take Him to the pillar and tie his hands tightly.
- 2. They rip open His tunic, exposing His back.
- 3. The first blow, it hurts so much, and then another and another.
- 4. Reflexively He tries to pull away, but His bonds hold Him helpless
- 5. They are laughing at His pain.
- 6. They so enjoy lashing out at someone who cannot fight back.
- 7. The malice hurts more than the physical pain.
- 8. Jesus remembers this is the way He shall conquer evil, by His patient endurance.
- 9. He looks past their cruelty to their withered souls and pities them.
- 10. He asks the Father in love that they might come to repentance and salvation.

Carrying the cross (persistence when one's strength is gone)

- 1. The rough wood lands heavily on His torn back.
- 2. His knees are weak and they buckle.
- 3. How can He possibly walk all that way?
- 4. He has no strength. He doesn't know how he is walking.
- 5. He forces each step, thinking it will be the last He can do.
- 6. On, and on, and on.
- 7. With each fall, lashes rain down on Him and he is kicked.
- 8. It would be easier to lie down and be whipped to death.
- 9. His Father gave Him the task, and he will complete it.
- 10. He goes on.

Crucifixion (helpless reflection on things we can no longer control)

- 1. Electric pain shoots through His hands and feet.
- 2. Each breath like climbing a mountain
- 3. Should He have explained things one more time to the twelve? It is too late now.
- 4. Those He had bested at debate look on and smile.
- 5. Someone He had cured now mocking Him
- 6. Should He have taken more time? He can't change it now.
- 7. He feels so alone.
- 8. His poor mother. All He can do is entrust her to a friend.
- 9. What He has done will have to do.
- 10. He gives Himself to the Father.
